Religious provision

We are a school with a strong general Christian ethos who welcomes pupils from a diversity of cultures, religions and backgrounds through its integrated ethos.

Each child's journey from Nursery to P7:

- regular times in the school year when both a Christian perspective is celebrated e.g. Harvest nativity plays, Easter as well as
- festivals from other traditions e.g Muslim celebration of Eid.



Friday mornings

- school sing together Christian hymns together from different traditions and style of music
- -includes hymns specific for the pupils celebrating the Sacraments from the Catholic faith.



Weekly assemblies: have a global citizenship theme -the essence of many faiths - try to be a better person and make the world a better place

Thursdays at 2pm - denominational RE class time, once per week



Catholic pupils

-prepare for their Sacraments by year groups together e.g. P4 and P5, P6 and P7 for specific faith lessons.

Other Christian pupils:

- taught general Bible stories
- have a progressive programme from Key Stage 1 upwards from a printed scheme.

Non Christian pupils: Parents:

- opportunity to discuss what provision they would like to be made for their faith with the Principal and class teacher



- make any needs known e.g. specific dietary requirements-no pork
- specific work the pupil may already be working on through their faith group.

Some parents choose to let their child listen and participate in class to the Christian lesson being taught as part of their awareness of other faiths.








Thinking Skills and Personal Capabilities Framework

These skills are taken from the Northern Ireland Curriculum and we try to encourage and incorporate these into our daily teaching.



Key Stage 2 Literacy Presentation targets

- 1.Date and title
- 2.W.A.L.T. (<u>w</u>hat <u>a</u>re we learning to do <u>t</u>oday) at the top of the page for each <u>new piece of</u> work
- 3. Handwriting is neat and words are spaced out.
- 4. Handwriting is generally written in joined up
- 5. Question numbers are written correctly and neatly to match the text book e.g. (a) (b) (c) or 1,2,3 or A,B,C

Key Stage 2 Numeracy Presentation targets

- 1. Date and title
- 2. W.A.L.T. (what are we learning to do today)
- 3. Centre line is folded and/or drawn down the page
- 4. Each sum has a sign
- 5. Each number has a separate square and sums are spaced out
- 6. Numbers are written correctly and neatly
- 7. Sums are numbered correctly to match the text book
- 8. e.g. (a) (b) (c) or 1,2,3 or A,B,C
- 9. All the answers have the correct unit of measurement
- 10. e.g. £ or p, cm, kg
- 11. Show working out

In Upper KS2 we encourage the children to take pride in their work and follow the above presentation targets in both classwork and homework books.



SEAG Preparation

- There will be a meeting for all P6 parents early 2025 to explain the SEAG process.
- For those children who decide to opt in for SEAG preparation, practice tests will begin around Easter. This is because the children will still be learning new concepts right up until October (Primary 7). They need to be taught the concepts before they can attempt the assessment.
- The children will complete 2 tests per week and will be required to complete their corrections at home. Progression will be much slower if corrections are not being completed.
- Children who do not opt in for SEAG tests in class will complete numeracy and literacy activities, providing reinforcement of what is being taught in class.

Marking pupils' work for improvement and progress

Corrections - use a coloured pen when doing corrections.

- Increasingly pupils will mark their own and a peer's work throughout Key Stage 2 under teacher's guidance.
- They learn from their peers.
- Increases their understanding of the need for good presentation.
- Teachers will also provide verbal/written feedback on a daily basis.





Responsibility for learning at Key Stage 2



help further their child's progress reinforcing skills taught in school:

homework - reading, spelling, mental maths, written and practical work. Provide support and guidance when needed. Please check and sign all aspects of homework - this highlights its importance to your child





teach according to each child's needs and abilityincludes multi- sensory teaching for all types of learners- SEN and Gifted pupils

Pupils



take more responsibility for their own learning by listening, writing and following instructions during activities increases their independence.

<u>Homework</u>

- <u>All</u> homework is prepared in class!
- Encourage more independence.



•Let your child take <u>responsibility</u> for knowing what needs done, to listen, write and know what to do. You are a guide! If in doubt, complete according to what your child reasonably tells you. If your child is <u>struggling</u> with a particular concept, we would encourage you to provide them with help and support.



Consequences of incomplete homework are not life threatening (!) so encourage resilience if they are asked to complete homework during lunchtime play or on top of that night's homework.

It's often a surprisingly quick fix!



Homework-please sign daily

- 1. Reading (from library books and reading material from set texts-variety-20 mins)
- 2. Mental Maths- (refer to Mathemagician book which can be found on the school website. It is important that time is spent learning the facts set each week.)

3. Written (30-40 mins)






Healthy break and lunch



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Purpose of seesaw in Acorn:

- Group photos or individuals as appropriate.
- Can be used as special form of praise.
- Seesaw is mostly used in KS2 for the teacher to send reminders.
- If you need to contact the class teacher please ring the school office.

Special Educational Needs

Meetings with the SENCo are not routinely available- Class teacher will liaise with SENCo if required.
